TES ADAR

Sixth Lubavitcher Rebbe arrives in America (1940)

After a 12-day sea voyage, the previous Lubavitcher Rebbe, Rabbi Yosef Yitzchak Schneerson (1880-1950), disembarked at the New York harbor on the 9th of Adar II of 1940, following his miraculous rescue from Nazi-occupied Warsaw. When the Rabbi Yosef Yitzchak Schneerson, the sixth Lubavitcher Rebbe, miraculously arrived on the safe shores of America in 1940, he declared: "America is not different".

Rebbetzin's Birthday (1901)

Rebbetzin Chaya Mushkah Schneerson (1901-1988) of righteous memory, wife of the Lubavitcher Rebbe of righteous memory, was born on Shabbat, the 25th of Adar, in Babinovich, a town near the Russian city of Lubavitch, in the year 5661 from creation (1901). In an address delivered on the 25 of Adar of 1988 (the Rebbetzin's 87th birthday, and about a month after her passing), the Rebbe initiated an international birthday campaign, urging people to celebrate their birthdays and utilize the day as a time of introspection and making resolutions involving an increase in good deeds.



- The Hebrew name "Adar" is related to the word "adir," which denotes strength and power. The Rebbe, Rabbi Menachem M. Schneerson, of righteous memory, points out that the term adir is used to refer to the Jewish people. What could be more apropos for the month when the Jewish people's fortunes are strong?
- The zodiacal sign (mazal) for Adar is Pisces, or *dagim* in Hebrew. In Jewish tradition, fish are a sign of blessing and fruitfulness. Also, just as fish live in water, the Jewish people thrive when immersed in the Torah, which is compared to life-giving water.
- Adar was the last month the Jewish people spent in Egypt before the Exodus. Adar's joy is so great, in part, because it serves as the opening to an even greater rejoicing: the miracles of Passover.
- Purim celebrates a time when we were at a low point in our history – but our relationship with G-d remained intact. Its joy is therefore greater than the joy of any other holiday, because it demonstrates the essential nature of our relationship with G-d — and that is a constant. The month of Adar, the month which Haman understood to be the most inauspicious month for the Jews, is the happiest month of the year—the month when we bear in mind that "inauspicious" has absolutely no bearing on our relationship with G-d.
- A month on the Jewish calendar includes either 29 or 30 days (reflecting the 29.5-day lunar cycle). But every two or three years — seven times in a 19-year cycle, to be exact — is a leap year with a double Adar. On these "pregnant years," as they're called, there's a 30-day "Adar I" followed by a 29-day "Adar II." In addition, 30th of Shevat is also the first of Adar I's Rosh Chodesh ("head of the month") days. This makes for a total of 60 "Adar days." The Lubavitcher Rebbe points out that the number "60" represents the power of transformation. A rule-of-thumb in Torah law is the "nullified by sixty" principle. For example, if a piece of non-kosher food accidentally falls into a pot of kosher food, the undesirable element is "nullified" if the desirable element is sixty times greater than it. Thus, the Rebbe concludes, in a year blessed with a double, 60-day Adar, all undesirable elements — every and any cause for pain, sadness, discouragement or dejection — are nullified and sublimated by the transformative joy of Adar.

PURIM WITH THE REBBE

I haven't spent a lot of Purim holidays in Crown Heights, but the one I remember was long long ago, only my second trip to Crown Heights.

My first trip was to the *Pegisha*—Encounter for college students—in December of 19—. There were lots of encounters with young Rabbis who were quite excited to have a large receptive audience. They did their best to get us to drop out of college and move into the neighborhood. (This was many years ago. The model has since changed!) There were speeches Thursday night, all day Friday, and Shabbos afternoon. Although I went to 770 Shabbos morning and saw the Rebbe, there was no Farbrengen. Saturday night was a *Melave Malkah* with Bais Rivkah girls screaming camp songs at full voice. I was ready to leave, but Devorah Alevsky convinced my friend and I to stay for the Sunday morning program. By the end of the weekend, I don't have a clear memory of my enthusiasm for the *Chassidim*, but we were both charmed by Devorah, and went back to Crown Heights the following Sunday just to visit with her.

My spring break that year coincided with Purim, so I decided to go back to Crown Heights and give it a second try.

Purim with the Alevskys and their four small children was hectic. I believe we heard Megillah in their house. I made rounds with Devorah delivering *Shaloch Manos*, and enjoyed seeing all the action on the streets. Devorah hosted a large dinner for supporters of Chabad, and I was somewhat on display as a college student who was choosing to become more Jewishly observant than I had been raised to be. And then there was a Farbrengen.

I had heard about the Rebbe's Farbrengens. I knew what to expect. What I didn't expect was my reaction. I stood in 770 for hours and listened to a language I didn't understand with rapt attention. To put the experience into words would be reductive. I was sure I was watching holiness in human form. It was transformative!

After that, I kept revisiting Crown Heights whenever I had the chance. The idea of moving into the neighborhood no longer seemed strange. It took a few years, but I did move in. I've been to many Farbrengens since that first one. Some time later there were transistor radios with simultaneous translation—in choice of English, French, Hebrew, or Russian. Often the subject matter was too far above my level of knowledge for the translation to be much help. But it didn't matter. **The experience of being in the Rebbe's presence, knowing he was giving to me, whether I was consciously understanding or not was always elevating.**

When I came home to Cleveland, the community would gather at the Chabad house, at first to listen to audio hookups of the farbrengens, and later to watch them on cable tv, with simultaneous translation. I remember schlepping my small children out late on snowy nights to see the Rebbe farbrengen. I am forever grateful to have had the privilege to have seen the living model of one whose every action testifies to his connection with Hashem.
